It is both an honour and pleasure to have been invited to send a message to the indefatigable authors of this e-publication, marking the first volume of "*Poetics of Geography*" in tribute to the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Department of Geography, at the University of the West Indies, Mona Campus in Jamaica.

Described as an eBook of memories, the collaborators - Cecille DePass, Faye Lumsden, Beverley Phillips and Eleanor Jones - have gone the extra mile to locate those who, whether as alumni and/or academics associated with the Department of Geography, have been willing to enthusiastically support its preparation, whether by way of articles, photographs or even poetry, hence the title.

It has been said that the work of UWI is the best kept secret in the Caribbean and beyond. No doubt, this is because the institution, in true British fashion (recall its early days as the UCWI, a college of the University of London) has been reluctant to blow its own trumpet, as the saying goes. Indeed, it is largely through our alumni and those near and dear to the institution such as the authors mentioned above, that the word is being spread – hence, the invaluable importance of publications such as this.

Poetics of Geography recounts the department's birth and separation from Geology, as well as its important role in fostering off-shoots such as Climate Change and Disaster Studies along with numerous informative conferences, seminars, and various publications. It should also be noted that success at Mona, and a growing demand throughout the Caribbean, led to the creation of a sister department at the St. Augustine Campus in 2012, as part of the Faculty of Food and Agriculture.

Poetics is also forward-looking through its section on "Life after UWI". Asking the question – "Are we there yet?" prompts the reader to contemplate beyond departmental concerns and reflect on the impact and importance of the University of the West Indies to the region.

I again commend the authors on this seminal, forward-looking piece so appropriately memorializing the Department of Geography's Fiftieth Anniversary, and trust that it will command wide readership.

Letter from Dr. Barry Floyd, UWI, Geography's Founding Head

My dear Cecille,

I do regret being unable to assist you any further with your admirable project: "Poetics of Geography, UWI". Let me say how truly impressed I am with the work you and your team have put in to produce so splendid a document, honouring 50 years plus, of our beloved subject, at the university level in Jamaica and the Caribbean.

Unfortunately, I did not maintain close touch with UWI, having left to return to Nigeria (via Durham) in 1972. When I arrived at the UWI, in 1966, Geography was located in the Faculty of Science. I came to UWI, having been forced to evacuate, as the Head of Geography, at the University of Nigeria, due to the Biafran civil war.

I sought over six years to have our subject located in the Faculty of Social Sciences. I firmly believed that our main emphasis should be on the human side of the discipline. This was reflected in the undergraduate syllabus which I developed. Our British external examiners also, firmly supported my efforts.

Ted Robinson, the Head of Geology and I, became great friends. He too, supported our planned re-location of the Geography Department. But sadly, we did not succeed in persuading the Senate to transfer the Department to the Social Sciences. Rather ironically, I later assumed the post of Head of Geography and Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences, at the University of Calabar, Nigeria.

Please let me know how I can make a contribution to the UWI Alumni Fund, with a special focus on supporting a needy student in Geography.

Prologue

With the fortuitous 50th Anniversary celebrations of the UWI Geography Department, Mona, in 2016, a small group of us associated with the Department in different capacities, decided to write an eBook: "Poetics" which morphed into two volumes. The book pays tributes to the founders and professors of the Geography Department who have played instrumental roles in our lives.

Knowing that in fifty years, a sizeable number of students have studied in the Geography Department between 1966-2016, we wanted to document some of our memorable experiences in a number of ways (via stories/narratives, poetry, photographs, illustrations, etc.). Initially, we approached a number of graduates, using a process very similar, to that in which a Christmas Cactus grows and blooms, profusely, repeatedly, sometimes for several generations. Some of its stems may be passed from grandparents to family and friends. Very often, they take root, and flourish, in less than favourable conditions.

Accordingly, by adopting our extensive friendship and collegial networks, we contacted a few of the graduates and professors who were key participants in the Department's formative years. By using such a purposeful process of revisiting and at times, excavating memories, we succeeded, to a greater or lesser extent, in gathering informative contributions from several graduates and professors.

Attending the Department's 50th Anniversary Conference and activities, at the Mona Campus, in late June 2016, however, Cecille DePass realized that there were a good number of professors who had made significant contributions to ensure that the Department maintained its reputation for excellence in teaching, research and service which had been established by its founders. Thus, the list of professors to be commended was expanded. In seeing the emerging themes develop from the submissions received and presentations at the UWI Geography Conference, in 2016, DePass decided to invite some academics such as, Brian Hudson, Hilary Robertson-Hickling (UWI), Yvonne Brown (formerly UBC), Margaret Dobson, and Mona Dillon (formerly U Calgary) to contribute either to Volume 1, and/or to submit more detailed book chapters to Volume 2. Their work became the foundations for the development of the 2nd Volume of Poetics which showcases a sample of publications and photographs.
