

RESEARCH INTO PRIVACY AND DATA BANKS

ABSTRACT

The issue of privacy represents, in many respects, a test issue or case study of social and cultural problems in a post-industrial, information-oriented, society. The issue has been created, in part, as a direct consequence of the efficiency of computers as information processors, and as an unintended product of the social benefits generated by computers; it has been created in part also as an expression of public concern about the relationship between computer power and the potentially manipulative power of institutions operating information systems. The issue has been the subject of extensive study in all advanced, western countries. The Canadian Departments of Communications and Justice jointly sponsored a Task Force inquiry, of which the report was published in December, 1972. A special inter-departmental committee is at present studying rules to protect privacy which could be applied to data banks operated by the federal government. Consideration is being given also to parallel issues such as the extra-territorial location of data banks.
