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Abstract

Introduction

Perhaps because this is "1984" we are more aware this year, than any year after '48 of just how far computers have tipped power in the direction of the large organization ... be that organization one of state or corporation.

Other writers have noted that Orwell did not really mention computers "as such" in his book. Yet it does not take much imagination to see how willing and useful computers, in particular, the database sort we deal with everyday as research librarians, might be in providing an "evil" state with the necessary information stuff for "Orwellian" control.

Since the time and input of Einstein and Turing we have seen the world transformed by nuclear bombs and computers. I will place the bombs in the "space" as opposed to the "information" domain but even after twenty years in the computer and information business I am not that comfortable with this distinction between "space" and "information" ... yet who would not admit that the violence of Hiroshima was "spacial" whereas the assault on my privacy by computers is an assault of my information domain. For this writer's eye these words "limp"; I trust the reader "knowing what I mean".

In the Beginning

At the onset of the nuclear age, the U.S.A. by trial and persecution of it's scientists, see Oppenheimer, did what it could to delay the spread of nuclear weapons. When I was working on the war gaming computers inside the Defense Hesearch Board more than twenty years ago, the Nuclear Club was still less than ten nations. How many is it today? Has the possession of Nuclear Weapons enabled the possessor to either stop or start a revolution or even to have it's own way. How about ten thousand AK-47's and the teenagers to carry them?

At the onset of the computer age, the few computers not in military use were either at universities or entombed in the tax department or a life insurance company. Throughout the sixties it remained so. Sure, computers became cheaper and found more and more application, but it was not until the advent of the personal computer that the possibility for the computer being an instrument of freedom not oppression became apparent.

Big Computers, Big Organizations

In part because this is "1984" and in part because large organizations have exceeded the boundaries of human decency in their mis-use of computers, average folks are increasingly aware of how computers are being used (mis-used) by large organizations in their pursuit of the individual, whether to sell, control or tax.

"Pardon me, there's a computer asking for you", is not a joke, it is the title of a (withdrawn) film Revenue Canada commissioned to frighten people. To the extent that fact and fear merge it might be taken as a sign of how things are proceeding in the bureacratic bowels of Ottawa.

Conversely

What about the converse? If the big guys can have their databases, their telecommunication grids, their LANS (local area networks) what is the chance/hope for the isolated individual. Ans. If over 40, if computer illiterate ... only political or luddite. If under 40, if computer literate ... this writer (43 but computer literate) says "out-compute/out-network them" much as the american revolutionaries "outgunned" the British in their war of independence (the old kentucky <u>rifle</u> versus the british <u>musket</u> story).

The article concludes by brief capitulation of the three options or reactions: political, luddite and "out-gunning".

Political

Freedom of Information.
